The Civil War began as a means of preserving the Union. But to nearly four million African Americans, it held a much more personal promise. As Northern armies swept south, self-emancipated slaves sought refuge behind Union lines. Determined to claim basic human rights, former slaves turned soldiers helped defeat their oppressors. But the road to freedom would be a rocky one. Despite continued oppression and violence, African Americans worked tirelessly to rebuild families torn apart by slavery, to educate themselves, and to claim their rightful place as American Citizens. Drawing on her dissertation research, Dr. deGregory talks about the critical role of education in the life and times of Tennessee freedmen. Topics of interest include the important role of literacy in the lives of blacks, both free and slave, the murder of Central Tennessee College student Julia Hayden as well as the extraordinary contributions of the Original Fisk University Jubilee Singers.
